

In Conversation with Students



In a bid to bring senior management a step closer to the students, FASS initiated 'Deanery-Connect' in Academic Year 2009/2010.

This is an informal session for students to converse with members of the Deanery and to share their expectations and learning experience in the Faculty. They can choose to discuss any topic and the dialogue is conducted in a casual and relaxed setting. In Semester 1 (September/October), some 50 students participated in four sessions, with a Deanery member taking on 10 to 15 students each session.

The sessions proved to be very insightful as the Deanery heard feedback on tutorial formats, curricular rigour, module bidding, career opportunities and school facilities. Some came with interesting suggestions while others sought advice on graduate studies and career mapping. With the success of this series, the senior management in the Faculty will continue with Deanery Connect in the following semester and encourage Department Heads to have similar informal conversations with their students.

The students were extremely candid in expressing what they liked about the faculty and what they would also like to see improved.
