COURSE DESCRIPTION

A humanities-based introduction to the field of Native American Studies, this interdisciplinary course critically examines an array of cultural expression by contemporary indigenous American writers, filmmakers, visual artists, and performers. While the course emphasizes the way Native people represent themselves, we begin with the powerful stereotypes of Native Americans that continue to circulate (hence, the "unlearning" aspect of the course), then look to the ways Native artists and writers appropriate, refute, and rewrite these images. As we read, screen, and listen, we'll attend to the political, regional, and tribal contexts informing these works, through supplementary reading in history, literary criticism, gender studies, and other disciplines. Key critical issues will include nation and sovereignty, indigenous feminism and two-spirit traditions, displacement and community, and the role of humor.
