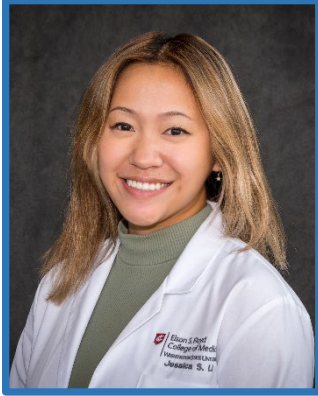
Clarissa Gaona Romero – *Summer Pediatric Research in Global Health Translation (SPRIGHT) Scholar*

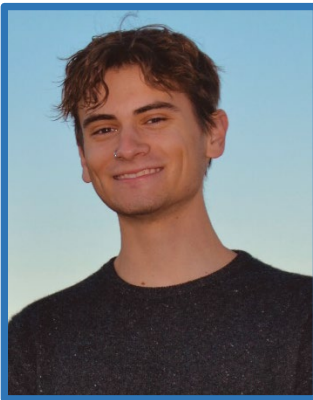
Jada Phillips, BS – *James A. Harding Scholar*
