The Appalachia Cooperates Initiative is a learning network connecting cooperative, community, business, and economic developers and advocates in Central Appalachia to:

- Develop practitioners' awareness and understanding of the cooperative model and of cooperative development resources to better recognize and act on cooperative opportunities in their communities
- Foster relationships among practitioners that will facilitate joint cooperative development activities in Central Appalachia and allow practitioners to better utilize existing resources
- Raise awareness of the cooperative business model as an opportunity for economic development and justice in the region





All About Collaboration

The Appalachia Cooperates Initiative was born out of a collaborative dialogue between partners in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia. The College of Food, Agricultural, and Environmental Sciences (CFAES) Center for Cooperatives at The Ohio State University leads the Initiative, facilitating and organizing sessions. The Initiative is guided by a collaborative of partner organizations throughout the region, including:
